Notes from the Build Site

I have some good news, some bad news, and then more good news. Let's start with the good news. We had a dedication for the Leaseburgs just a couple of weeks before Christmas. I can't think of a better Christmas present. After some well deserved time off over the holidays and waiting for electrical and plumbing inspections, we are finally back to work on our second house in Uniontown. The plumbers finished the rough in. Jim Fredenburg, our electrician, got all of the electrical roughed in and we got the line set installed for the mini split HVAC. We passed all of our inspections! Thanks to the hard work of the Codger Crew and community volunteers, we were able to install all of the wall insulation in one day and we are currently hanging sheetrock. This team is absolutely awesome and they always seem to exceed my expectations. Now that things are getting somewhat back to normal, it is really great to have volunteer groups back on the build site.

Now for the bad news. Just over a month ago we lost one of our Codgers. Roger Willemsen passed away unexpectedly. Roger was a longtime member of our team. He was a good friend, a mentor to many and one of the finest craftsmen that I have had the pleasure of working with. He has left a huge hole in our hearts and he is missed every day.

So how about a little more good news? We welcomed a new team member, Jacob Maurin. Jacob is working with us half time for the next 3 1/2 months through the Rural Resources employment program, to learn the construction trade. We are in the planning stages of our next house in Moscow. The future homeowner is Aimee Martinez, and I am looking forward to working with her. Darryll Sherman, a local architect, donated his time and talent to design the home. The City of Moscow awarded Palouse HFH up to \$20,000 to cover the costs of permitting and water and sewer hook ups, terrific support since we expect the Martinez home to cost \$171,000 to build. Which brings me to my last point—Beans 'n' Jeans is just around the corner. Please dig a little deeper this year. We cannot do what we do without your help. Habitat Ramps and Rails Program—what is it all about?

In keeping with the guiding principle of Habitat for Humanity that everyone should have a decent place to live, we have added a corollary: every homeowner should have safe and accessible entry to and from their home. We work with low- and very low- income homeowners around the Palouse, repairing porches and stairs, adding handrails, etc—and mostly by installing ramps. Sometimes a ramp is needed for a short time (a person may have a knee replacement and be in a wheelchair for a few weeks, or a longer time (an older person may need to use a walker permanently.) We install modular ramps, either aluminum or wooden, depending on availability and whichever is more suitable for the situation. Modular ramps are designed to be both installed and removed easily and re-used elsewhere so we can lend ramps with no charge, just like checking a book out of a library.

We work as a team with the Disability Action Center Northwest, and the Moscow Central Lions. DACNW has purchased a large number of aluminum parts, for which we provide storage, and the Moscow Lions have a team of experienced ramp experts who work with us on installation and retrieval. When wooden ramps are appropriate, we build the modular parts with the Lions in our warehouse. From December 2021 through February 2022, despite the slowdown for the Christmas season and the COVID-19 surge, we were busy. We installed two wooden ramps and three aluminum ramps, retrieved two wooden ramps and two aluminum ramps, repaired a ramp (installed by another organization) and installed a vertical platform lift (not an item we offer regularly, but this was donated to us, and we've put it to use at two homes so far). There are now 60 ramp installations currently in

use throughout Whitman and Latah counties. Since December, our ramp team has been in Moscow, Deary, Potlatch and Lewiston in Idaho, and St. John, Malden, Endicott and Diamond in Washington. We set a new record this past year—serving a total of 39 homeowners.

We meet Wednesdays at our warehouse on the south end of Moscow and travel together to the volunteer site. It's a good crew and we could
